Christmas in Honduras



Hondurans share many of the same Christmas traditions we do. All over the world, Christmas is a time for food, family, and celebrating Christ's birth.

Most Hondurans will tell you that Christmas is not Christmas without tamales. Chicken is the most common filling but every family has a recipe that they think the best. If you aren't able to make your own, many women sell tamales at Christmas time, taking orders from friends and neighbors. They are often shared with neighbors or relatives as a gift in the way that those in the U.S. often exchange cookies or other treats at this

time of year.

Las Posadas is a tradition where relatives will go to spend the night with one family on Christmas Eve. Of course, sometimes the visits can last for days.
